is a world that works for everyone!

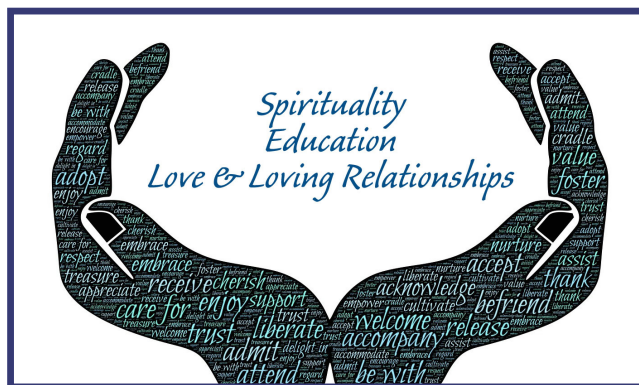
OUR MISSION...

Before they entered PCSL for the first time, they already loved his messages.

Simone Matteucci and Doreen moved from Santa Rosa, California to Battle Ground, Washington. They belonged to CSL in Santa Rosa which has a very large congregation. Before they moved, they googled CSL centers in Washington and Oregon and were directed to Rev. Larry's podcasts. Before they entered PCSL for the first time, they already loved his messages. The welcoming greeters immediately won them over. They were home.

Spiritual growth has been a major theme in Simone's life. She was a practicing Catholic into her forties and emulated her mother who prayed and said the rosary daily. "It was just something you did-you prayed." In her forties she realized she was considered a sinner because of her lesbianism. It spurred her on to check out new thought beliefs which began to make sense to her. "My spiritual growth took many turns, but it was always the theme of my life." Simone continues to develop a deeper spiritual life as the most recent practitioner graduate at PCSL.

A perfect day for Simone includes a visit to the beach with a blanket and a good book; Jones Beach with its white sands and Pebble Beach and its sand dunes are special to her. A few years ago, she visited Tuscany, Italy. Simone walked where her father walked as a boy in the town of Lucca with its wall surrounding the village. She felt more connected to her dad after that.

Simone's parents were devoted to each other for over fifty years. Her father was the family hero who worked during the depression and supported his immediate family, his wife's family and his family. She sincerely believes that wherever family is, there is home. "My four daughters are priceless. They are each different and I value their uniqueness." As the matriarch of her family, Simone thrives on the energy of family gatherings.

Simone is the organizer of a lesbian social service group called L-Connection, which is 150 strong. The group wants to increase lesbian visibility in the Vancouver, Washington area. Triple Point, which is an organization for LGBT youth, receives 10% of L-Connection's contributions. The group provides community and social gatherings for lesbians, and for many, the organization is family. For Simone, it is a spiritual venture.
