The full board met for its annual retreat in May. It was a time to get to know the newest members (Cheryl Collins, Nadine Moller and Sarah Stebbins). The main project was to charter a Strategic Planning Committee which has been a goal of Rev. Larry's for several years. The committee will use a format from the Home Office to create a 2-3- year operational plan for PCSL. A Strategic Plan takes us from being a reactionary board to a proactive board.

An Executive Team was established of Rev. Larry, Cheryl Collins and me, Janine Stewart. We will make the meeting agendas and prioritize action items in order to make the best use of our time. Several policies are up for review, as well as Rev. Larry's Letter of Call. A short-term Human Resources Team (Nadine Moller, Rev. Larry and Janine Stewart) will perform the reviews.

At the Annual Meeting, following a Board recommendation, the congregation directed the Board to pursue hiring an architect/space planner to come up with a plan for remodeling our current building. Jason Hutchison and Doreen Marchetti interviewed architects in our area and suggested that we hire ONE TO ONE, architect, Nicholas Locke, to prepare a base documentation, feasibility and concept report at an estimated cost of \$2100.00.

Free to dream, free to move towards your dream, nurture you dream.


Free to use your intuition, to listen to your inner voice.


